

GOOD NEWS to those who have no access to Facebook or Facebook Live! Beginning this Sunday, 17th May 2020, we will begin to stream the Sunday Mass on YouTube at 10:30AM. Our parish



YouTube Channel is <u>ST JAMES PARISH COORPAROO</u>. Subscribe to our Channel, by clicking on the subscribe button to get notified about our latest videos. We would truly appreciate it if you could share this information to our fellow parishioners, especially those whom we have been unable to reach out thru *Facebook*.

Allow me to explain a couple of reason/s why we have not (until this Sunday) streamed or broadcasted the online mass on both platforms (*Facebook* and *YouTube*) simultaneously. When we began reaching out to our parishioners through our online masses and social media, the more familiar platform between the two in terms of interface and navigation, personally speaking, was Facebook. In addition, when we began our streaming on Palm Sunday in early April, the parish already has an existing Facebook account with existing members and 'followers', but no YouTube account yet. And so, the compelling choice at that time was to stream the mass through Facebook.

From the onset, I was conscious of the limitations of streaming through *Facebook* only. It is clear that not everyone, across age groups, has access to *Facebook*. However, it is also clear that we have been reaching out to a number of parishioners and beyond week after week thru this platform.

To address this limitation, we have managed recently to finally create a *YouTube* account for the parish, and we are learning the basics of putting out a video on this platform. As I've indicated even before, we need to consider in the equation the strength of the internet connection and the power of the computer, if we are planning to *decently* stream on both platforms simultaneously. At the moment, after running a few tests, there are a few hiccups with the audio and video quality when streaming thru to two platforms at the same time. Hence, the decision for now to do it one after the other, that is, 8:00AM thru Facebook Live, and then 10:30AM thru our YouTube channel. May this endeavour help us to reach more of our parishioners, so please share info!





An Advocate for Life


Jesus continues his last discourse with his disciples. He tells them (and us) if they love him and observe his commandments, the Father will give them another advocate, the Spirit of truth. Jesus tells them he will be leaving them soon but they will not be left orphaned.

The catechism tells us that God is truth. In fact, God is the only absolute truth. All other truth is relative. Truth is limited and condition by all sorts of things, including physicality, relativity, time, and culture. Three people can witness an accident and truthfully testify to seemingly contradictory statements. Their truth can be dictated by the where, when, and how of their relationship to the incident. It can be coloured by personal viewpoints (prejudice, associations with other life experiences) or by personal limitations (eyesight, height). Only God is absolute truth, because only God is limitless.

We know that even church truths change. We all remember that Galileo was considered a heretic because he proposed that the sun did not revolve around the earth. If the church is open to admitting limitations in its belief system, we should be as well. As new ideas of faith or church or even God challenge us, we need to constantly pray to remain in the truth, reminding ourselves that the one and only absolute is God.

Life's journey is about learning and growing,

constantly filtering the truth as we see it through the witness of the church and our own everexpanding experiences. In John 18:37, Jesus tells us that he came into the world "to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." It is in allowing Christ to live in us and bowing to our own limitations that the Spirit of truth can reign in our hearts.


On a lighter note, the anti-bacterial


