

Message from the Parish Priest

Australia has received good news, more than a week ago now, in regards to the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions, even if by stages. In Queensland, we are in Stage 1 at the moment, and beginning on 12 June Stage 2 starts and we shall have more leeway. This freedom includes the anticipated reopening of our places of worship. And as the 'Roadmap to Easing Queensland's Restrictions' has indicated – the reopening will take place gradually with compliance to COVID-19 public health rules.



Our parish is working closely with the Archdiocese of Brisbane, which has required us to comply with a checklist that they have provided. We will submit to them this completed form, and then await their nod for when we can reopen. I fully support this COVID-19 Safe Plan of the Archdiocese as it allows parishes to do more preparations in the background, and if you ask my opinion, it is in fact a prudent way of executing the ease of restrictions.

Under Stage 1, the celebration of Mass *with a congregation* for all parishes in the Archdiocese continues to be suspended. This applies to both weekday and Sunday masses. Please be reminded that all Catholics remain dispensed from their Sunday obligation until further notice.

Fr Dang and I continue to celebrate Mass (for the people) on weekdays and Sundays. As I have indicated in last Sunday's bulletin, we have now moved from our Priory Chapel to St James church. At weekday masses and the Sunday live stream mass, the limit for all people in the church for the duration of Stage 1 continues to be no more than 10 (including the priest, other ministers and camera operator when livestreaming).

Alongside this anticipation of more ease of restrictions here in Australia in the next couple of weeks, there is worrying news from my hometown in Cebu City, Philippines with its own fight against COVID-19. Among the 42,045 "barangays" in the country (perhaps the equivalent concept to this here in Australia is a "suburb"), Barangay Mambaling, where I grew up and where my family still resides, ranks number 1 with the most positive cases in the whole country, and needless to say in Cebu City which consists of 80 barangays (imagine Coorparoo ranking number 1 in the whole of Australia)! It is hard to determine whether it is a consolation or not, but most of these positive cases are asymptomatic. I am glad that most of the affected are not suffering from any symptoms. But knowing first-hand how 'staying at home' has proved to be very challenging with the living conditions back in some areas of the country, our barangay included, I am concerned as to how this condition might affect other people eventually. People who might be more vulnerable and more susceptible to symptoms. Mum and Dad and other members of my immediate family are safe, and they continue to do their best to remain so.

Reflecting on all this, I say I am very blessed here in Australia. The ease of restrictions have allowed me to gradually enjoy what the guidelines permit me to do. But together with this, there is the constant awareness of holding in my prayers, those who continue to struggle with the pandemic, and continue to entrust to God these situations which are out of my control.

I wonder if the risen Christ, who appeared to the disciples in Jerusalem and Galilee, and who bid farewell to them during his Ascension, has generated a similar dual reaction from his disciples: the elation of encountering the risen Lord, and the sadness of not enjoying the physical presence of Jesus. The circumstance that most Catholics find themselves in now is similar: it is Easter time, and most still cannot receive the sacrament of the Eucharist.

What remains for me as a source of peace is Jesus' promise to the disciples, "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. ...The Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid." (John 14:16, 26-27). Our risen Lord has to go to the Father (Ascension) so He and the Father can send the Holy Spirit (Pentecost). Our God is always with us, I pray you encounter God's peace too. And I pray we continue to listen to our Lord's call to mission, which is the Church's message to us this Ascension Sunday. Keep safe everyone!



Bringing Home the Gospel

I once heard a religious educator say that a disciple was like an apprentice. A disciple doesn't have to have it all together—she makes mistakes. She is someone who is still learning. An apprentice also needs mentoring. She needs someone to teach her and instruct her, but she also needs someone to show her how to be whatever it is she is apprenticing to be.

He Is With Us

Jesus has lived his life, died, and risen. He has taught his disciples everything he had to teach. Before he leaves them for a final time, Jesus tells them to make disciples of the whole world, teaching all they have learned and baptizing in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.



We are disciples of a trinitarian God, baptized in the name of the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit. Our way into the divine life of this Trinity is through Jesus. Jesus, the Son, is our brother, our savior, and our mentor. He shows us how we can share in his divinity by teaching us to accept our humanity.

It was by living his life completely and embracing his death fully that Jesus became our way and our mentor. He accepted his limitations and embraced his vulnerability. He showed us how to live through pain and loss and die with questions left unanswered. And through it all, he shared his love with everyone: friends and enemies alike. As disciples, we try, and sometimes fail, to live our lives as Jesus lived his, but like all good


