The warm south wind was blowing stronger on the mountain top. It billowed the robes of Jesus as he stood at the highest point of the Mount of Olives. Jesus' face was uplifted now and a lightness seemed to be shining from it.

Peter, standing with the rest of the eleven disciples, was reminded of the night when Jesus was transfigured on another mountaintop in Galilee. The group of mystified disciples formed a protective circle around Jesus as he began to rise and dissolve before them. And then, suddenly he was gone. Only the wind remained. It took a long time for the disciples to realize what they had just experienced. So many images raced in their minds: Jesus dragging his heavy cross; the brutal nailing and raising of the cross; the anguish and weeping and his death. They remembered the darkening of the heavens, Jesus' burial, the stone, the discovery by the women and the astonishing revelation that he had risen from the dead. They held the vision of his appearances at Emmaus, in the room at Jerusalem, on the shore in Galilee and now, here, again.

Peter became the new centre of the circle of disciples. He was wondering what to do when he looked west toward Jerusalem. From across the Kidron Valley Peter could see the entire city. From where they stood Jerusalem didn't look so formidable. The final instructions of Jesus had been "Go into the whole world and proclaim the good news to all creation." They would begin in Jerusalem. With courage and strength building in his heart, Peter began to lead the disciples back down the Bethany Road toward the lofty fortress walls of Jerusalem. As the group of disciples made their way down the winding mountain trail, the fullness of God's presence was poured into them. They received the power of faith. They remembered the last words of Jesus: "...use my name to expel demons...speak entirely new languages... handle serpents...drink deadly poison without harm...and the sick upon whom they lay their hands will recover." Waves of rapturous joy swept through the returning band of disciples as the presence of

Jesus continued to shower down upon them. They felt as if Jesus was walking at their side. His love and his life were being reborn in their hearts.

Justice Challenge

When Jesus ascended into heaven, his glorified physical body was no longer with us. But he commissioned the apostles (and us through them) to be his body on earth until he came again. We are called to be the hands and feet, the heart, the mouth, the shoulders of Jesus to those in need. Your challenge this week is to ask which part of the Body of Christ you are

What am I doing with the gift of the Spirit?

I once heard a religious educator say that a disciple was like an apprentice. A disciple doesn't have to have it all together—she makes mistakes. She is someone who is still learning. An apprentice also needs mentoring. She needs someone to teach her and instruct her, but she also needs someone to show her how to be whatever it is she is apprenticing to be.

We are disciples of a trinitarian God, baptized in the name of the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit. Our way into the divine life of this Trinity is through Jesus. Jesus, the Son, is our brother, our savior, and our mentor. He shows us how we can share in his divinity by teaching us to accept our humanity.

It was by living his life completely and embracing his death fully that Jesus became our way and our mentor. He accepted his limitations and embraced his vulnerability. He showed us how to live through pain and loss and die with

questions left unanswered.

As disciples, we try, and sometimes fail, to live our

lives as Jesus lived his, but like all good apprentices and disciples, we try again. A great thing to remember is that Jesus is not just the ideal—someone we look up to and try to emulate— Jesus is our mentor. He walks with us, helping us clean up our messes. He constantly shares his love and his life with us so that we can share it with others.




