Parish Updates and Reminders

As of this writing, a new case of COVID-19 in QLD has just been reported. The person who has recently come from interstate has unfortunately contracted the virus; she is a school employee from the Logan area. On how things will unfold in the next couple of weeks (and what impact this may have with the continued reopening of our church), your guess is as good as mine.

Complacency vs Vigilance. St James Church has reopened for masses with a congregation for at least two months now with the last few Sundays a congregation of up to 100. I would like to express my appreciation to everyone who has been mindful and consistent with registration for use in contact tracing, and for the fact that most were happy to use the hand-sanitisers and hand wipes available inside the church. Now, perhaps speaking from my own experience, one of the very natural tendencies that I could see myself doing- once something is carried out with some regularity- is resorting to some degree of complacency. I hope we would not become complacent in regards the system we have set in place, which is there for our own protection. Just to encourage everyone, let us continue to be vigilant in complying with the protocols.

Let us be aware of these basic reminders to prevent the spread of COVID-19:

- Clean your hands often. Use soap and water, or an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Maintain a safe distance from anyone who is coughing or sneezing.
- Wear a mask when physical distancing is not possible.
- Don't touch your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Cover your nose and mouth with your bent elbow or a tissue when you cough or sneeze.
- Stay home if you feel unwell.
- If you have a fever, cough and difficulty breathing, seek medical attention.

The experience was also new to him, and so I thank him for the willingness to learn a new set of skills needed for this. He is happy to come back for the streaming of Tuan Anh's Deaconate Ordination.

For this weekend, the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time, 2 August 2020, the available masses in the church are only the **Saturday 6pm VIGIL Mass** and **SUNDAY 9am Mass.** Also, as advised weeks prior, our Facebook live streaming ended with last Sunday's streaming.

From **August 8th / 9th**, we will **conditionally** return to our 4 masses on the weekend. There was uncertainty in the weeks prior to this coming Sunday (2nd August) as to whether we could continue to get marshals; marshal roster was available for a month before that and still only a couple were volunteering then. This is one of the reasons for the hesitancy in re-offering the other mass times. But now, a few parishioners have responded positively to our call, and so again from **August 8th / 9th**, we will **conditionally** return to our 4 masses on the weekend. But we need more marshals for other dates.

Please be reminded that if we don't have a marshal registered for a particular weekend mass slot, then the registration for parishioners via Eventbrite for that mass slot will not be made available. (For example, if there is no marshal registered for Sunday 7am, then there is no registration for parishioners for that Sunday 7am mass as a result). This is an essential criterion for the reopening of our churches. The Marshal monitors the numbers, and sees to it that parishioners use the hand-sanitisers and hand wipes available in the church (just a clarification: marshals do not do the cleaning for the parishioners. Parishioners should attentively clean after their own touch areas). AND SO, we need more parishioners of marshal age to please book up the marshal spots for all the weekend masses in eventbrite. Let us continue to pray for one another.

Meeting the Needs (and Wants) of the Many



Jesus leaves his friends to find some quiet time for prayer, but the people follow him. Once again he finds himself surrounded by a crowd. When evening comes, Jesus' disciples tell him to send the people home. There is not enough food for all of them. Instead, Jesus takes the few loaves and fishes available, blesses them, and feeds the thousands.

One of the messages we can take from this Gospel is that God's love will take care of our every need. When I think about this reading, it doesn't surprise me that God is called Father (or Mother for that matter). A parent's love is an awesome thing. I remember when my children were infants; their every need was anticipated. I would do anything humanly possible to take care of them and keep them close.

When they got older and began confusing wants with needs, life became more difficult. For example, to our fourteen-yearold, buying the latest sneakers that everyone was wearing was clearly a need. As bill payer in a family with five growing children, expensive sneakers were definitely a want. When our children's wants weren't met, life sometimes wasn't easy. Their anger at not receiving what they wanted would often separate us.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Talk about needs and wants. Ask everyone to give two examples of each.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What is your greatest need right now? How can you go about getting what you need? If you are not able to get what you need, how will you do without it? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Too often, my own reaction to their feelings or moods only exacerbated the situation. It was only when


Sheepish Question:

I could remember that I was the grown-up and stay calm and firm in a just decision that we could sometimes negotiate a happy ending. (Shoes were certainly a need, so we would set a reasonable amount to put toward sneakers. If my son wanted to buy the more expensive brand, he could earn the money to make up the difference.)

It's hard to say no to our children; after all we want them to be happy. But we are circling a bottomless pit if we give into their every want, and we are teaching them a dangerous lesson if


we reinforce the notion that things can make them happy. Our responsibility is to teach them the difference between wants and needs, and then, like God, the allloving parent, provide as best we can, all that they truly need.
