The theme Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor, affirms that "we human beings need a change of heart, mind, and behaviour". It draws from Scripture, from the theological tradition, from Catholic Social Teaching, and from the wisdom of the world, including the insights of the First Nations. In the statement, the Bishops invite the whole Catholic community to join them in taking up Pope Francis' invitation to a sevenyear journey towards total ecological sustainability, guided by seven Laudato Si' goals.





Just Believe

The people become even more persistent after the miracle of the loaves and fishes. They follow Jesus across the sea. Jesus wonders if they are just following him because of the miracles. When they ask Jesus how they too can perform the works of God, he tells them they must believe in him.

There is a classic scene in the stage version of Peter Pan when the sparkling light that is Tinker Bell begins to dim. Peter looks out at the audience and tells them that Tinker Bell's light will go out forever if they can't convince her that they believe in her. Peter encourages the audience to clap as hard as they can to convince the little fairy of their belief. As the noise from the clapping grows louder and louder, the sparkle that is Tinker Bell grows brighter and brighter.

Wouldn't it be great if we could have our children just clap their hands to show they believe in Jesus? And wouldn't it be even

greater if their clapping made Jesus' presence as real as Tinker Bell's light? Actually, making all of that happen isn't a whole lot more difficult.

If you want your child to believe in Jesus there are two things you can do. First, let him hear you talk about what Jesus means to you. Second, show her that you believe in Jesus by your actions. Let your child see the light burning brightly in your heart. Like the applause that con-

Justice Challenge

This week the Church remembers Blessed Pope Paul the VI. One of his most famous quotes is, "If you

want peace, work for justice." This idea comes from years of Catholic social teaching responding to the world and the issues at hand in any given age. This statement can be clearly understood today. Just take a look at the civil war in Syria. At the heart of the



refugee crisis is a lack of justice from a government that has amassed wealth while the people go hungry or without opportunities for education and participation in decisions that

affect them. Followers of Jesus Christ must work to alleviate issues that attack the dignity of the human person with works of charity and acts of justice. What exactly does that mean? When Syrian refugees are hungry and homeless, we must feed them and help them get the safe homes they deserve. Those would be acts of charity. At the same time, we can encourage our government to pressure the Syrian government to alleviate the problem and find solutions that will benefit the people and ensure the people won't suffer so terribly ever again. Policy and political change are both ways to bring justice. Both are needed to make change happen.

Your challenge is to choose an injustice you see in your community. Ask questions about the issue. What do I know about this injustice and what don't I know? Who is affected by the issue? Who has the power to change the


