Jesus Talks About Our True Treasure

Jesus tells his followers to be careful where they place their hearts, and how they prioritize their values. If they are given much, much will be expected of them. He goes on to warn them to be ready at all times to answer for their behaviour. "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (v. 34).

If asked where my treasure lies, without a doubt I would say my family. Probably my biggest regret is not having spent enough time with each of my children. Now that they are grown and busy with their own lives, I regret those lost moments.

I learned the phrase tempus fugit in high school Latin class but never really understood its meaning until I reached middle age. Now I know how quickly "time flies." Toddlers become teenagers and, before you know it, you are celebrating a grandson's First Communion.

Time is a precious commodity, not anything to be squandered on "to do" lists. At its best, it is a gift that's meant to be generously shared with those we love. I remember the busyness of family life. It takes so much

time to cook and clean, shop and do laundry, take care of the yard, attend Little League games, and on and on. There are only twentyfour hours in a day, eight of those spent at work or school, and of course we have to sleep.

It is so easy to let the days slip by with no time to play. But scientists tell us that play is an essential part of a healthy life, even for adults. Playing together as a family teaches us how to interact and develop relationships of trust and mutuality. We can learn to communicate in comfortable, informal settings. Play can even help us let go of aggressive tendencies. And it is a great way to relieve stress.

Try reclaiming Sunday as family day. After church, spend a few hours playing together. Fly a kite, toss a Frisbee or just sit home



Why does it matter that people discover their God-given vocations? Because the Church relies on the unique contribution of every person. As St John Henry Newman reflected, God has created me to do some special service: God has committed some work to which has not been committed to another. I HAVE A MISSION".

Where is God calling you?

This Sunday's Readings 19th Ordinary Sunday (Year C/2) First Reading Wisdom 18: 6-9 Just as you struck our enemies, you made us glorious by calling us to you.

That night had been forefold to our ancestors, so that, once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage.

This was the expectation of your people, the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies; for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes you made us glorious by calling us to you.

The devout children of worthy men offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord: that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike; and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of the fathers. Today's Psalm 32(33):1,12,18-20,22 Happy the people the Lord has chosen to be his own.

Ring out your joy to the Lord, O you just; for praise is fitting for loyal hearts.	The Lord looks on those who revere him, on those who hope in his love.	Our soul is waiting for the Lord. The Lord is our help and our shield.
They are happy, whose God is the Lord, the people he has chosen as his own.	to rescue their souls from death, to keep them alive in famine.	May your love be upon us, O Lord, as we place all our hope in you.

Second Reading Hebrews 11: 1-2, 8-12 We will look for the city designed and built by God.

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended.

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

All these died in faith, before receiving any of the things that had been promised, but they saw them in the far distance and welcomed them, recognising that they were only strangers and nomads on earth. People who use such terms about themselves make it quite plain that they are in search of their real homeland. They can hardly have meant the country they came from, since they had the opportunity to go back to it; but in fact they were longing for a better homeland, their heavenly homeland. That is why God is not ashamed to be called their God, since he has founded the city for them.


It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead; and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

Gospel Reading Luke 12: 32-48 See that you are prepared.

Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming," and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.
