From the Outside of the Window

"You put aside the commandment of God, to cling to human traditions" – we hear today in the Gospel of Mark. The evangelist summarises herewith the perennial struggle that we also experience daily as baptised Christians living in a secular society.

Because human traditions are constructs of human making, they can also be changed for the better or the worst. In the latter case, traditions may lead to a systemic abuse. In my view, that is currently occurring in some dioceses throughout the Catholic world. Interpreting traditions in corrupt ways have resulted in thousands of cases of sexual abuse inside and outside the walls of the Church. The cover ups by Cardinals and Bishops have helped the clerical abuse to become a system that not only tolerates, but even protects such heinous crimes. How, otherwise, is it possible that the wolves in sheepskin could ascend to such high ecclesiastical ranks? Once in power, they extend their powerful arms over their protégés who for decades have preyed on those in vulnerable states. Perhaps, over the years, the Church has copied and interpreted traditions in such corrupt ways that have permitted and sustained these sorts of abuse of power. Some bishops argued that their cover ups only intended to protect the reputation of the Church. Yet, does the Church of God need such a protection based on crimes? Or, does God not rather demand the proclamation of truth on which God wants to build his Church? It is about time to repent, to re-think and importantly to change ecclesial structures and traditions in line with the commandment of God. If the current state continues, the Church will have no moral authority or say in matters that are important for our society.

During my recent trip to Vietnam, I also witnessed traditions interpreted in an evil way. With the support of many friends, my brother and I spent most of our annual leave in one of the poorest parts of the world. There, I truly have witnessed this gift of unconditional human worth. Yet, local officials have created a jungle of laws that not only restrict us in assisting the needy, but also ban any work of charity. Too often, local officials threatened us with imprisonment and confiscation of all goods. Yet, we are Christians obeying God, who commands us to go to the end of the world to spread His unconditional love and care for those in need.

I have seen many children who are born to leper's parents. To be precise, I have visited about 456 leper's families in the most remote places you could imagine. With no running water, no electricity, no road, and no access to telecommunication, it was very difficult to bring material relief to lepers who rely on external assistance. Together with the courage and generous support of many friends, we were able to assist each family with 10 kilos of rice, a litre of oil, a litre of fish sauce, a carton of 30 packs of instant noodle, a kilo of meat (if available), a kilo of dried fish, a kilo of sugar, a kilo of salt, a pack of soap and laundry liquid, and various medication. During my 3 weeks visit to the lepers, we spent around 27,000 AUD to buy 5,000 kilos of rice, 500 litres of oil, 500 litres of fish sauce, 1,500 packs of instant noodle, 500 kilos of meat, 500 kilos of tried fish, 500 kilos of sugar and 500 kilos of salt etc.. As you can imagine, it was quite a logistical achievement to bring all the goods to the lepers who are spread over the most remote places. Additional to the material assistance, I was able to provide scholarships to orphans whose parents died due to leprosy. These children will receive education and accommodation at the State schools. Our next project is to build a house for 45 orphans in the remote village near Sông Mã which borders with Laos. These children have lost their parents due to leprosy. The diocese of Huong Hoá is willing to purchase the land for the construction of an accommodation for orphans.

I listed all these here, not in order to impress you. The reason why my friends and I - with the help of many generous donors who I would like to thank here - do this work of charity, is our commitment to the "worth" of each human person, to those whose "dignity" is denied all too often by their society or human traditions. Once their dignity is denied, they are also deprived of their rights to live. As a Christian, I just follow the "alternative" way of thinking and doing. God's commandment is to love those who are deprived of human rights (like in the time of Jesus, lepers are outcasts). And I have experienced in person that this love has paid off manifold. Last month, some children of the lepers, who otherwise would have been deprived of a good future, have graduated from their schools and are now attending universities. I am very convinced that they will be good human beings for the betterment of their peoples.

Returning from my annual leave, I have discovered a wonderfully clean St. James. So, my sincere thanks to the brass cleaners. I am also grateful to Jean, Lorie and Sylvia for their generous assistance during the annual leave of Trish. Fr. Saldie, Fr. Brian and Dcn Dang need also to be mentioned here. Mille grazie for your fraternal help during my annual leave.
