The *instrumentum laboris*, draws heavily on the voices heard during the Listening and Dialogue and Listening and Discernment phases of the Plenary Council, but also from other key sources. It is entitled *Continuing the Journey*. A number of key themes emerge in the document, including:

- •renewing a Christ-centred Church that heals wounds and warms hearts;
- strengthening practices of discernment and synodality;
- •the call to co-responsibility in mission and governance;
- •embedding a response to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse;
- •renewing and supporting the ordained ministry;
- promoting discipleship in parishes, families and young people;
- •forming prayerful and Eucharistic communities that are eager to engage in society for the service of all;
- proclaiming the Gospel in a change of era;
- •renewing the Church's solidarity with First Australians and those on the margins of society;
- •promoting an integral ecology of life for all persons, societies and our common home, the Earth.

The Importance of Ecumenism

The apostles are upset. They tried to stop a man from driving out demons in Jesus' name because he was not one of Jesus' immediate followers. Jesus tells them not to prevent the man from working miracles. Jesus tells them that no one who was against him would have that kind of power.



The apostles sound a bit cliquish in this Gospel. They seem to be saying that only "card-carrying" Jesus followers are allowed to work miracles in Jesus' name. Jesus tells them to look at the fruit of the venture, and to remember, "[W]hoever is not against us is for us." Jesus statement serves well to remind us of the importance of ecumenism in the Catholic mindset.


The Catechism tells us that God is truth and love. Since we were created in the image and likeness of God, these two attributes are essential in our own lives if we wish to follow Jesus. Living one's life in truth and love is the litmus test for the children of God. If someone is living life honestly, searching for truth and acting in loving ways, she is on the right path. She is walking with God.

I think in today's world, Jesus would probably tell us to stop being so parochial, so legalistic and tell us to be more ecumenical. God's plan has always been a universe filled with peace and harmony. All people are called to be one with each other and one with God. In God's world there is no place for nit-picking over irrelevant details.

Jesus asks us to look for the good we see in another's life (the fruits) no matter their religion. Ecumenism means looking for and concentrating on the things we have in common with folks. We need to name and celebrate the things that bring us together and work our way diligently through those issues that separate us.

Ustice Challenge Refugee and Migrant Sunday 26th September 2021 (From St Peter and Paul Bulimba Social Justice Group—Bne East Deanery)

1. Sign the Catholics for Refugees Petition to the Morrison Government HELP REFUGEES by signing the petition calling for change to Australia's inhumane policy towards refugees. - 3. Join via ZoOm with Catholics from around Australia in a "Call to Lamentation" at 7pm on 26th September (organised by the Josephite Justice Network, 150 Days of Action for Refugees) On the 26th of September we will all join together for a Call to Lamentation and Commitment on the World Day of Migrants and Refugees. This is what we propose to do and we welcome you, your families and communities to be a part of it.

On Sunday the 26th of September at 7pm you join us all on zoom. We hope to have up to 500 people partake in this ceremony. We will begin with a welcome to country. Then have a call to prayer sung to us. We will then ask that everyone turn out their lights and light a candle in the dark. We will hold our candles in the dark as we read out the names of all the people who have died in Australia's detention camps over the last twenty years. At the end we will have a prayer of lamentation and conclude with a call to all our elected representatives to again asking for our three requests.

This zoom ceremony will be recorded and the final video will be sent to every Senator and MP in the Federal Parliament. We are making a ceremony of lamentation that is also a political document. 


