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## From the Outside of the Window

The absence of Frs. Saldie (from 2/10 - 2/11) and Dang (23/9 - 18/10) from the parish gives me some quiet time to reflect on important questions of life. While reading the Sunday's gospel, the meaning of happiness reappears in my thoughts. The more I ponder about it, the more I see a connection to the current abortion debate in QLD. Through the media we have learnt the various views of the campaigners. So, there is no need to repeat them here. I just want to share some philosophical premises that the media seems to ignore.

In order to answer the question of happiness ("What is happiness"), I need to consider first the issue of the worth of life. Freedom is the fundament of a happy life – nobody would disagree with this statement. If I cannot do whatever I want to, I am not happy. So, freedom must be unrestricted because I ought not to be submitted to anything except my own free choice. Moral philosophy calls it a "negative freedom" in the sense that I must be free from any obstruction that hinders me to realize myself. If something obstructs the realization of my rights, I am not happy. This includes the right to handle my body as I please me. I own my body and everything which belongs to it. Because the body is owned by me, the foetus is in my possession as well. So, I can do with the foetus whatever I want to.

Advocates of abortion see life therefore as a personal possession. So, the value of life is to be measured against its usefulness to me. If the foetus does not fit into my personal lifestyle that I chose freely, then I should be permitted to discard it since the foetus is in my ownership. Am I not able to do with my possession whatever I want to?

I find this type of reasoning very alarming. If life is but a possession and not anymore inviolable, who warrants that the life of the owner of freedom itself is not subjected to the ownership by another person? If there is no warranty that my life is sacrosanct, I am still free to do what I want? If I have no life, how can I be free to choose? If the body is not more than just a "commodity" that I can modify or discard to suit my choice of life, who warrants that my choice of life is inviolable? Nobody can exist without a body. If it is so, the body is not my possession but an intrinsic expression of my personal identity. To violate against my body is to distort my identity, my personhood. So, the argument of the advocates for abortion would backfire here.

The Bible never envisages a freedom that ignores the body. Because the body is created together with the spirit by God, the body is therefore sacrosanct (inviolable). St. Paul even said that the body is God's temple too. To destroy a part of the body, is to harm not only the individual but it also affects the community because we all belong together to the one body of Christ. Over centuries, Christians care not only for the soul, but for the body in its wholeness as well. That is the reason why at the funeral liturgy the body of the dead is incensed before the final burial. Even in death, the body does not lose its worth because Christians simply believe in the resurrection of the body. St. Paul said that nobody ever hates his/her own body, but he/she cherishes and nourishes it (Eph 5:29).

I believe that abortion contradicts the understanding of true freedom and authentic dignity of a human person that consists of soul and body. The foetus is not just a compound of lifeless biological materials. Important is that it is part of my body that expresses the person who I am. To discard it means also to violate against my own identity.

To me, happiness is not just about the realisation of my freedom from anything, but rather to have the courage to live my life meaningfully even at the cost of disadvantages and drawbacks. This includes the resolution to accept the fragility of my own body in the Pauline sense that in my weakness I am the strongest because Christ who died for me lives in me. Unlike other religions, Christianity encourages the faithful to face up to sufferings. There, the true face of love is manifested. The more I love the stronger is my compassion. True freedom is not about avoidance, but about facing up the headwinds of life. Here lays the secret to the transformation of a person.

The value of life cannot be measured. Its usefulness cannot be reduced just to the moment of expiration. Each moment of life is worth living because it is a gift to us. God's benevolence is the clue to happiness.
